	<b>Name of Charity / Programme</b>	<b>Brief Description</b>
1	AWWA Special School	This is a Special School for children with multiple disabilities, aged 0-12 years. The school also offers an Early Intervention Programme for infants and young children and project challenge for children with autism.
2	As-Salaam PPIS Family Support Centre	<p>This Centre targets Malay-speaking single parents and their families, particularly those from lower income groups.</p> <p>Services offered include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>i. Family casework and counselling which addresses specific concerns related to loss, grief and adjustment arising from different circumstances of single parenthood, coping with single parent living and reconstitution of family. Provides practical help such as short-term financial relief and advice and information on divorce procedures at Syariah Court.</li> <li>ii. Salaam Support Programmes for Children of widowed or divorced parents which facilitate their acceptance of loss, learning of coping skills and moving on to face new challenges in life through group process and peer support.</li> </ul>
3	Bukit Ho Swee Family Service Centre	<p>This Centre is a community-based agency which provides integrated remedial, preventive and developmental services to help families cope with their responsibilities, challenges and problems.</p> <p>Its programmes include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ Casework &amp; Counselling</li> <li>○ Information &amp; Referral</li> <li>○ Preventive/developmental programmes for children, youths and families</li> </ul>

4	eGEN (by Fei Yue Community Services)	This programme uses the latest communication technology to reach out to youth who are internet savvy and who may find on-line counselling less threatening and easily accessible. Full-time staff supplemented by trained volunteers will deliver the services.
5	Fei Yue Early Intervention Programme for Infants and Children (EIPIC)	The objectives of this programme include: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ Providing a safe and stimulating learning environment for children with developmental delays (including Down Syndrome, Cerebral Palsy, Autistic Spectrum Disorder, etc) between 0-6 years old in a holistic programme that is embedded in their daily routine activities in school and at home.</li> <li>○ Empowering parents/caregivers with practical knowledge and skills in being facilitators for their children's physical, cognitive and social-emotional development.</li> </ul>
6	Grace Orchard School	This is a Special School for children aged 6 to 18 years with mild to moderate intellectual disability and those who are on the autism spectrum.
7	Katong School	The special school provides special education for children with mild intellectual disabilities (IQ 50-70), aged 6-12 years.  The aim of the special education programme is to provide education and training so as to enable the children to have the necessary skills, attitude and personality to lead normal independent lives in adulthood.
8	MINDS Jurong Gardens School	These two special schools provide special education for children with intellectual disability, aged 4-18 years. They aim to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ Maximise the potential and ability of intellectually disabled children through special education, so as to enable them to live as independently as possible.</li> <li>○ Undertake activities and programmes in order to achieve the above goals.</li> </ul>

10	Rainbow Centre Balestier Special School	This Special School aims: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ To provide special education and rehabilitative services for children below 16 years old</li> </ul>

11	Rainbow Centre Early Intervention Programme (Margaret Drive)	The early intervention programme aims to improve the child's developmental skills and to help the child gain educational skills through intensive developmental and therapy intervention. As a result of early intervention, some children would qualify to enter mainstream schools (kindergarten or primary) and families would gain a greater understanding and knowledge of how to work with their child and strategies to enhance family relationships.
12	Rainbow Centre Training & Consultancy	This programme aims to enhance the learning of children with special needs and to facilitate successful integration into mainstream schools. The programme targets children special needs attending mainstream pre-schools, their families, as well as the staff of mainstream schools.
13	Singapore School for the Visually Handicapped	<p>This programme aims:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ To provide a comprehensive programme of education that will meet the individual needs of the visually handicapped children and enhance their development intellectually, socially, emotionally, physically and spiritually.</li> <li>○ To assist the adolescents in the School cohort develop an understanding of their unique skills, abilities, limitations and interests, thus preparing them for vocational training.</li> </ul>
14	Tanglin School	This special school provides special education for children with mild intellectual disability, aged 13-16 years. The aim of the special education programme is to provide education and training so as to enable the children to have the necessary skills, attitude and personality to lead normal independent lives in adulthood.

	<b>Name of Charity / Programme</b>	<b>Brief Description</b>
15	WeCan (by Autism Resource Centre (ARC))	<p>The ARC WeCAN programme serves children with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) aged 2-6 years. It offers a curriculum geared towards preparing these young children for mainstream schools. Classes are conducted daily, with one-to-one preparatory sessions offered to new intakes.</p> <p>The children are grouped according to their functional level with the highest functioning being placed in Track 1 for preparation to enter mainstream pre/primary schools. Track 2's children are placed in smaller classes with a focus on work habits, self-regulation and functional communication and social skills. New intakes are placed in Track 3 where one-to-one intervention is provided before the children proceed to either Track 1 or 2.</p>
16	Singapore Autism School	This is a special school that provides education and training to help children to acquire the necessary skills, attitude and personality to lead normal independent lives in adulthood.
17	St Andrew's Autism School	As a dedicated school for Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), SAAS will be offering a special curriculum targeted at those pupils aged 13 to 18 with moderate to severe ASD with intellectual disability.
18	The Children's Aid Society (Melrose)	<p>This charity caters to the needs of children aged 4 – 12 years who require care or protection. Exceptions are sometimes made to cater to children who fall outside of this age group, depending on their needs and what is in their best interest.</p> <p>Children requiring care and/or protection are those whose parents or family members are unable to care for them or to supervise them. These children are referred to this charity by government agencies, Members of Parliament, family service centres, hospitals, schools, members of the public or the family members themselves.</p>
19	Canossaville Children's Home	This Home aims to provide shelter and integrated services to young children and

		<p>adolescents who are at risk or who lack adequate family support for their well-being and development.</p> <p>It hopes to reach out and support these children and their families through individual and group counselling, skills development, learning support and other programmes.</p> <p>The home has the capacity to accommodate up to 30 residents. The duration of the stay for residents varies from case to case. It may range from 6 months to several years.</p>
20	Muhammadiyah Welfare Home	<p>In 1989, the Singapore Government closed a number of Children Homes to give voluntary organizations the opportunity to provide the said service. The Muhammadiyah Welfare Home then took over the management of Muslim children in December 1989.</p> <p>The objectives of the Home are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• To provide shelter to abandoned children and those in need of care and protection due to neglect or abuse.</li> <li>• To provide shelter to girls in moral danger.</li> <li>• To provide a comprehensive and carefully tailored rehabilitation program to help the residents modify their behavior and equip them with the essential skills necessary after their discharge.</li> <li>• To inculcate positive values like discipline and responsible behavior, respect for others, filial piety, so that the resident can be a useful and responsible member of his/her family and society.</li> <li>• To work in conjunction with MCDS and to receive children sent by MCDS, Police or the Court in accordance with Children and Young Persons' Act (CYPA).</li> </ul>
